



Who's really in control here? Daniel answers the all-important question for those confused Jewish people trying to figure out how to survive under Gentile rule. In Daniel 5 Nebuchadnezzar is no longer king. Daniel reemerges as the chief interpreter of divine things, but what he has to say isn't going to sit well with Babylon's quasi-king Belshazzar. The writing's on the wall, Babylon will fall, and it's not a lack of military strength or an unstable economy that threatens the mighty Babylonian empire. Instead, it's a rot that begins in the heart of man capable of bringing down the mightiest of empires from the inside out, the corruption of a prideful king whose arrogant heart gives flesh to the proverb "Pride goes before the fall." Daniel interpretation enlightens the arrogant king that the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob has numbered his days.





Past Enemies Become Prophetic Players

History and prophecy merge with one another seamlessly in Daniel's final vision, but it's important to note what's history for us is prophetic for Daniel and the displaced Jewish people who eagerly wait to know what their future holds. Israel sits in the middle of an ancient battle fought between two Greek kingdoms: the Ptolemaic (South) and Seleucid (North) kingdoms. These two kingdoms fought for more land and more power and Israel was the fulcrum. Daniel's final vision opens with a brief summary describing the rise and fall of the Persian kingdom and Classical Greek period under the leadership of Alexander the Great. The focus of the majority of his vision rests on one Greek ruler, Antiochus Epiphanes. The history and prophecy of Antiochus Epiphanes work to reveal the character and nature of Antichrist in events that are yet to unfold. The turmoil surrounding Israel in Daniel 11 is the vehicle to get the reader to the hope of His revealing in Daniel 12 when God will deliver His people, "And those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the sky above" (12:3).

 - a. In the midst of the great trouble on earth, they will lead many to "righteousness" (salvation)
 - 2. "They will shine forever and ever."
 - a. Jesus promised, "the righteous will shine forth as the sun in the kingdom of their Father" (Mt. 13:43)

II. Preserving God's Revelation for Israel, Dan. 12:4-13

A. Prophetic Seal: God commands Daniel to "shut up the words, and seal the

book," v. 4

- 1. Preserve this book until the time of the end
 - a. "Many will run to and fro" searching for answers to the times
- 2. Command to seal the book stands in contrast to instructions to John not to seal, Rev. 22:10
- B. Prophetic Time: How long will the fulfillment of these wonders last? v. 5-7
 - Vision of two angels, one standing on each side of the Tigris River (Dan. 10:4)
 - a. One asks Christ a question
 - i. How long will the Antichrist be able to persecute Israel?
 - 2. Christ lifts both hands–indicates the importance of His oath
 - a. "It shall be for a time, times, and half a time," v. 7
 - i. Three and one-half years until it is finished
- C. Prophetic Outcome: What will be the outcome of these events? vv. 8-10
 - 1. The prophecy given to Daniel left him with more questions
 - a. "I did not understand"
 - 2. He asks Christ, "What shall be the end of these things?"
 - a. The revelation is sealed for those who will experience the end
 - b. Daniel would not live to see the end
 - 3. God gave Daniel an insight
 - a. Many would be saved during the end
 - i. They will understand Daniel's revelation
 - b. Others will remain in their wickedness
- D. Prophetic Order: Two time markers are given, Dan. 12:12-13
 - 1. Second half of the tribulation lasts 1,260 days
 - a. Begins with the breaking of the covenant, Dan. 9:27
 - 2. 1,290 days–From the time Antichrist puts an end to sacrifices & desecrates the Temple
 - a. 30 additional days for Messiah's Second Coming judgment, Ezek. 20:34–38; Mt. 25:31–46
 - 3. 1,335 days Blessed is he who waits and survives
 - a. Marks the inauguration of the Millennial Kingdom
 - 4. God commanded Daniel to go on with his life
 - a. He would be raised again at the end of these days
